#### In India:

The Indian Government in conjunction with the World Bank is launching an India-wide Self Help Group and Rural Livelihood Programme that aims to reach 80% of the rural poor. This is a large programme, designed to take-over all established Self Help Groups and introduce comprehensive training and regional marketing strategies to upskill the participants and consolidate the resources of the groups.

This has significant implications for ARD's Women's Empowerment project, which will no longer receive Government support for the Self Help Group programme. We are concerned that the transition to the new programme will not disadvantage the women in the present groups and are working to this end.

ARD therefore needs to find a new way of operating in the area and is looking at a Government supported Joint Liability Group (JLG) programme that works in a similar way to Self Help Groups, though unfortunately without such a rights-awareness focus. The capacity is there to work with men as well as women, though at this time we see ARD(Aust)Inc role as primarily supporting Women's Empowerment, which will flow on to the village as a whole.

ARD in India is also looking at an innovative programme for Improving the Learning Capacity of Diverse Students in Rural Govt. Primary Schools in Gaya District. The overall objective of the project is to increase learning capacity and retention of children from socially diverse communities in government rural primary schools by facilitating inclusive teaching-learning practices and processes, improving instructional quality and enhancing school effectiveness.

## **Monthly Success Story:**

Self Help Group Member's name: Gayamuni Devi



## **Family Background:**

Gayamuni Devi is a simple woman. At fourteen years of age she married Brikshkishor Mistry and went to live with his family. She is now 45 years old. Her husband is a day labour. She has three daughters. Two of them study in Govt. school, in classes nine and seven and the eldest daughter married last year.

## Past scenario of Gayamuni Devi:

They have no land, so agricultural labour and day labour are their main sources of income. Both of them work in other landlord's fields throughout the growing season. When anybody in the family suffers from illness, it is difficult to them for meet the cost of medicines. The very low income of the family also creates problems in educating the children.

## **Inspired by ARD's Animator:**

Gayamuni Devi was inspired by Suman Devi, who is a member of a Self Help Group (SHG) and employed as an active animator with ARD. Gayamuni Devi asked Suman Devi to help her to join a SHG, after which she formed Durga SHG with help of Suman Devi.

### **Present scenario of Gayamuni Devi:**

After the formation of the group, each member started to save Rs. 20 every month and opened a savings account in the bank. Gayamuni Devi received tailoring training from ARD. After getting the skills, she took a loan from the SHG to purchase a sewing machine. She returns the money every week from her earnings. After returning the first loan, she took Rs.7000 (AU\$130) again for the marriage of her daughter. Now she also has been returning this loan. Now the living condition of Gayamuni Devi and her family have improved significantly and she is happy to have joined a SHG.
